Taekwondo was introduced in the summer of 2021 as an addition to the Unlimited Dance Company at MCRC. The martial arts group led by our instructor, Laura Buzbee, has provided both therapeutic and social gains for the boys involved. The group has grown to include six martial artists with different backgrounds and diagnoses from our therapy programs. Taekwondo serves as an additional therapeutic activity for those in one of our therapy programs or for those who have graduated but still benefit from the physical and social interaction. This extracurricular at MCRC has provided an inclusive outlet for boys who may not otherwise be able to participate in traditional martial arts programs.

Taekwondo is a martial art derived from the Korean art of punching and kicking for self-defense. The physical benefits involved in learning taekwondo are many including improving flexibility, balance, posture, strength, motor planning, and endurance. In addition, martial arts can improve mental health by increasing self-esteem, focus, confidence, concentration, and self-discipline. Laura has seen firsthand how the use of this martial art form has benefited the physical, mental, behavioral, and social abilities of each of the participants. Laura shared, "MCRC is an incredible place, and we are fortunate to be able to provide this outlet within a program where students learn to know as well as show their own mental and physical strength and capabilities. They are all strong, competent, kind, and respectful young men and they are learning with every

taekwondo lesson how to achieve their goals. We're so proud of our students!"



The martial artists in the group recently earned their yellow belts after mastering the tasks in their belt test. Each of the boys involved has seen a direct benefit from the program, but one has shown remarkable progress.


